





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Dementia and complex dementia

The Dementia Centre is an international leader in dementia care research and innovation.

Our focus is on improving the quality of life for those living with dementia, and their families, by providing worldclass research that promotes positive change in policies, practices and services related to dementia care.

Through collaborative efforts, the areas of research in which our multidisciplinary team of experts specialise include complex dementia, evaluation of aged care and dementia services, non-pharmacological interventions for treatment of behaviours and psychological symptoms of dementia, and pain in dementia.

All research activities completed by The Dementia Centre are based on the foundation of evidence-based practice, and the desire to always be developing, implementing and refining innovative models of care to enhance the lives of all people living with dementia in Australia and internationally.

Projects in 2022 showcase the innovative work of The Dementia Centre and include:

- Characterising and assessing the government-funded Dementia Support Australia programs.
- Reviewing and refining the 7-tiered model of behaviours and psychological symptoms of dementia to provide valuable insights for shaping future policies and practices.
- Gaining insights into the knowledge and education of individuals practising religion who support people with dementia, and their carers.
- Investigation of the model of care, design and impacts of Specialist Dementia Care Program units for people living with severe behaviours and psychological symptoms of dementia (BPSD).

Clinical trials

HammondCare hosts sponsored clinical trials to investigate new drug-treatment options in the areas of early-stage dementias and related conditions.

We also recruit to cooperative group trials in palliative care symptom management.

Participants in our clinical trials program are integral partners of the investigative team. Areas covered by clinical trials in 2022 included new, potentially disease-modifying Alzheimer's disease medications such as monoclonal antibodies targeting amyloid and tau pathology.

Several trials we have participated in over the past four years have resulted in the investigational drugs' approval for use in Alzheimer's disease by the USA Food and Drug Administration. We recruit participants to trials of medications for people with cancer-related symptoms such as appetite loss and neuropathic pain. Trials we have participated in over the last few years resulted in the first PBS listing of a medication for breathlessness.

Palliative and end-of-life care

HammondCare's palliative and end-of-life care research program is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life and overall wellbeing of people living with life-limiting illnesses, and their families.

Our research considers the person's health and wellbeing from a holistic perspective that goes beyond the physical condition and encompasses psychological and spiritual aspectsof care, as well as support for family members.

In 2022, our research program concentrated on disseminating and implementing project outcomes in the following areas:

- Resources and training for frontline aged and primary care staff to initiate end-of-life conversations and assess palliative care needs of people living with dementia, and their families.
- Expanding the role of paramedics in palliative care.
- Development and evaluation of interventions that promote dignified and compassionate end-of-life care in acute, community and aged care environments.
- Improvement of health outcomes for people with cancer through our clinical trials program to support management of pain and other symptoms.

Ongoing collaborations with national and international stakeholder organisations such as the Palliative Care Clinical Studies Collaborative (PaCCSC), CareSearch palliative care knowledge network, and the Cancer Symptom Trials group ensure our research outcomes are effectively integrated into practice.

Positive ageing, restorative care, reablement and rehabilitation

Declining physical functioning and frailty are major challenges that affect people as they age, decreasing their independence and taking a toll on a person's quality of life.

Our research on positive ageing, rehabilitation, restorative care and reablement recognises this. Our aim is to develop new service models to meet the challenges facing our ageing population, harness the best available evidence to incorporate into the clinical services we deliver, and rigorously evaluate what we do.

The scope of our research primarily involves people admitted to hospitals with serious health setbacks for which there is a need for person-centred rehabilitation; older people living in the community who are challenged by functional decline, both physical and cognitive; and the specific needs of older people with high care needs who are subject to homelessness.

During 2022 our research focused on:

- Developing new models of service delivery for rehabilitation in the home (known as 'RITH'), to offer home-based rehabilitation as a viable option in place of needing to be in hospital for rehabilitation.
- The evaluation of HammondCare's new aged care home for older people subject to homelessness.
- Arts on Prescription programs delivered at home for people living with dementia.
- The evaluation of a new Arts on Prescription program for people in hospital in our palliative care, rehabilitation and older person's mental health wards.
- Evaluation of our community-based restorative care programs for older people with frailty and chronic disease.
- Rehabilitation for people with a cancer diagnosis.

As well as maintaining an active clinical practice, Chris oversees the clinical services and research activities of HammondCare's Centre for Positive Ageing. There is a strong emphasis on the principles of rehabilitation, and strategies to maximise a person's functional ability and quality of life, and on mental wellbeing.



Professor Susan Kurrle

Sue works with key HammondCare stakeholders and researchers on projects to improve care for people with dementia. She holds the Curran Chair in Health Care of Older People in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Sydney and is a geriatrician at Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Hospital and the Eurobodalla Health Service in Southern NSW Local Health District. Sue's

research interests include recognition and management of dementia, prevention and management of frailty, prevention of falls and fall-related injuries, successful ageing, and intergenerational care. She chairs the Cognitive Impairment Advisory Group for the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care and is a member of the Advisory Council for the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission. In 2022 Sue was awarded the Sidney Sax medal for outstanding contributions to development and improvement of Australia's healthcare system, and in January 2023 was appointed an officer of the Order of Australia for distinguished service to medicine as a geriatrician, and for research in dementia and cognitive function.

In 2022, Josephine served on the National ACP Engagement Advisory Group, the National Palliative Care Project Leaders Network, the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care Cognitive Impairment Advisory Group, the Palliative Aged Care Outcomes Program Essential Collaborators Network and the Abstract Review Committee for the Oceanic Palliative Care Conference.

Josephine contributes to teaching various health professionals about palliative care and ACP locally, nationally and internationally. She is also leading the revision of palliative care teaching.



Associate Professor Stephen Macfarlane

Steve is an Associate Professor in Aged Psychiatry at Monash University. He is coconvenor of the Advanced Training Program in Aged Psychiatry for Victoria and sits on a number of committees for the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists (RANZCP). Braeside Hospital also contributes to the RAPID program run by the University of Technology Sydney. Amy believes that best-practice palliative care should be widely available and would like to ensure patients with palliative needs have dignity and quality of life at end of life.

Associate Professor Andrew Cole

Senior Staff Specialist Rehabilitation Medicine and Chief Medical Officer, HammondCare

Andrew works clinically at Greenwich Hospital and remains in the medical governance role for HammondCare. In 2022, he continued with regular medical student academic work at Macquarie University and UNSW, and presented lectures and seminars to doctors, nurses and allied health professionals in continuing education and training programs in rehabilitation, community health and aged care settings in Australia, Greece and China. He is involved with various committees of the International Society of Physical & Rehabilitation Medicine.

Andrew's work with older patients in need of rehabilitation after surgery, cancer or medical illness has led to development of these programs in hospital inpatient settings, with further work in developing models for these programs to be provided in community settings.

Friedbert has established key community outreach geriatric services in South Western Sydney and is prominent in the development of community aged care and rehabilitation services within HammondCare Health, the South Western Sydney Local Health District and NSW Health. In 2020 the Archbishop of Canterbury awarded John The Lanfranc Award for Education and Scholarship and in 2022 John was elected a Fellow of the British Academy. This is an award granted by the British Academy to leading academics for their distinction in the humanities and social sciences.

Dr Mustafa Atee

Research and Practice Lead, The Dementia Centre, HammondCare

Mustafa is a clinical and academic pharmacist with adjunct and honorary positions with Curtin University, Edith Cowan University and the University of Sydney.

His research interests include pain in dementia, models of dementia care, geriatric pharmacotherapy, deprescribing, and the use of technologies in healthcare. Mustafa is a co-inventor of PainChek®, a point-of-care Al-enabled medical device that assesses pain in non-verbal adults including those living with dementia. In 2019, the Federal Government awarded Mustafa \$5M to conduct a national trial of PainChek® for Australians with dementia living in residential aged care homes. Mustafa's work has been recognised with state and national awards, including Innovator of the Year, Incite Awards, iAwards, AMY (Digital + Technology Collective), Premier's Science Awards and the Curtin Alumni Innovation Award.

Dr Phil Austin

Research Fellow, The Palliative Centre, HammondCare

Phil Austin is a research fellow within the department of palliative care at Greenwich Hospital, HammondCare, a visiting fellow at the Palliative Care Clinical Studies Collaborative at The University of Technology Sydney and a module leader on the Masters of Pain Management at the University of Sydney. Phil is also an osteopath working at St Luke's Hospital in Potts Point, Sydney.
